

Thomas Maloney taught ancient Greek philosophy, medieval philosophy, and the philosophy of religion.

- Should a Christian be cautious about declaring conception to be the beginning of the human person?



Asaf Angermann is interested in exploring how philosophy can change the world. He specializes in critical social theory, a discipline that examines the impact of society, culture, and ideology on the way we think, feel, act, love, and desire. He thinks about the relations of politics, religion, race, gender, and sexual identity – how they can inform but also deform one another.

Sample public presentations:

- What are the connections between racism, sexism, and homophobia? How can they be detected and dismantled?
- Is love a religious, sexual, ethical, or political concept? Do we have to love all our neighbors?
- Jewish and African American perspectives on love, race, and civil rights.
- Philosophical idealism and critical race theory



Other potential topics in these scholars' areas of expertise – from the mind and the self to the meaning of life, from ethics in medicine and society to the role of art and religion in life – may be feasible.
