
## **U.S. Perspectives (P1)**

Perspectives refers to the difference that differences make. All courses in Perspectives will examine the ways in which components of identity and social and material stratification affect positively or negatively life experiences, opportunities, and sense of belonging in national or global contexts.

Courses in U.S. Perspectives (P1) will broaden students' understanding of how the experiences and opportunities of individuals and groups in the United States are shaped by the various historical, cultural and social structures and processes of stratification. These courses will center on the interactions of demographics and the dynamics of social systems. Students who satisfy this requirement will *demonstrate* that they are able to do all of the following:

1. Identify how historical, social, and cultural structures and processes shape understandings of social stratification in the U.S.
