

#### **OPERATIONS**

## Air & Climate

• UofL's 2017 Greenhouse Gas Emissions Report documented that emissions increased 11% in 2017, a troubling reversal of progress in the last year during which the university's financial crisis resulted in a 100% budget cut for Climate Action Plan implementation. This knocked us off track from achieving our first milestone goal of a 20% emissions reduction by 2020 from our 2008 baseline. In 2016, we stood at an 18.69% reduction from the 2008 baseline. In 2017, we are back down to a 13.51% reduction. We must act quickly to cut emissions another 6.5% in order to achieve our goal. (S'18)



In September 2017, the Louisville Medical Center
Board voted to approve the conversion of the Steam
& Chilled Water plant that heats and cools buildings
at HSC from coal to natural gas, with the goal of
having new boilers operational in 2019. (F'17)

# **Buildings & Energy**

#### **ENERGY EFFICIENCY & RENEWABLE ENERGY**

- UofL Housing switched laundry equipment vendors with new Energy Star washing machines and dryers that consume 40% less water and 25% less electricity than the original machines in all halls. (F'17)
- UofL implemented a <u>Conservation Vacation</u> in December 2017. Staff conducted a walk-through of all UofL dining facilities to ensure all possible equipment was shut off or unplugged. Physical Plant took effort to conserve energy by reducing the heat a few degrees in most academic buildings on all campuses. Everyone was encouraged to do their part



by turning all lights off and making sure all electrical appliances were unplugged and all windows and outside doors were closed and locked prior to leaving for the break.


# Purchasing

- UofL adopted a new Life Cycle Cost Analysis policy as reflected in all RFPs: "When applicable the University shall use "Life Cycle Cost Analysis" as an evaluated component of the Best Value Award process. Products (energy/water consumption and building system components) shall be evaluated on, but not limited to, product cost, installation, operation, maintenance, and disposal costs. Vendors shall be required to include any requested Life Cycle Cost information and calculations associated with the use of their products with the submitted bid/proposal. Failure to supply Life Cycle Cost information may deem your response as non-responsive." Products include but not limited to:
  - General Appliances (refrigerators, freezers, washers, dryers, etc.)
  - Computers/IT equipment
  - Building system components
  - Selected plumbing items
  - Selected electrical items

# Transportation

- The Council convinces RideAmigos to provide complementary online platform for trip-planning and carpool-matching, <u>Cardinal Directions</u>, which displays all transportation options and impacts on one intuitive map.
- Council & Institutional Research conduct comprehensive <u>Commuter Survey</u> of UofL students, faculty & staff which documents significant backsliding in our progress to reduce vehicle miles traveled after the elimination of the Climate Action

Plan implementation budget.



June 2018: New free, electric LouLift shuttle between Belknap Campus and downtown. TARC's free, allelectric LouLift shuttles run daily every 20 minutes (30 minutes on weekends) along 3rd St. from the Patterson baseball stadium to the Speed Museum, connecting Belknap campus directly to Old Louisville & downtown destinations such as Central Park, Simmons College, Spalding University, LFPL Main Library, the Convention Center, and the KFC Yum! Center.



Winter 2018: 4th Street Bus Shelter Improvements
 The old, poorly maintained bus shelters on 4th Street at Louisville Hall and University Pointe were replaced



with clean, modern, glass TARC shelters serving north-bound routes.



#### **BICYCLING**

 UofL received official designation from the League of American Bicyclists as a Silver-level <u>Bicycle Friendly</u> <u>University</u>. The designation is valid for four years

2017-2021. See feedback report for what UofL needs to do to increase our Bike-Friendliness. This marked the second time UofL achieved such designation. The first was in 2013. (F'17)



 Posts installed to keep cars from parking in 4th Street bike lanes. At the request of the Council, Louisville Metro installed flexible posts along 4th Street at University Pointe to address a perpetual problem of cars illegally parking in the bike lanes on both sides of the street where the roadway narrows. (F'17)



Pavement & curb-cut improvements north of Belknap Campus. Anyone rolling off Belknap Campus (on bicycle, skateboard, roller skates, wheelchairs, scooters, etc.) to the north, including those traveling between Belknap and HSC, got a smoother ride over the summer of 2018, when significant improvements were made to key streets and sidewalks that provide



access for bicyclists and pedestrians. Repaving (including bike lanes) and complete rebuilding of intersection curb-cuts for ADA compliance was implemented on portions of Cardinal Blvd/Brandeis Ave, Brook Street, 1st Street, and 4th Street through Old Louisville. (F'17)

- The Council's ever-popular, nationally-recognized, award-winning <u>Earn-A-Bike program</u> was suspended due to 100% Climate Action Plan budget cut (F'17).
- From May-Sept, the Council and Get Healthy Now organized UofL participation in the <u>National Bike</u> <u>Challenge</u>, incentivizing dozens of active riders to pedal tens of thousands of miles.






 LouVelo city-wide bikeshare with stations at UofL and over 300 bikes at 27 locations from Belknap to HSC offered half-priced memberships to the UofL community. Sustainability Council continued negotiations to bring five new stations to Belknap campus in 2018-19.





## Solid Waste

 In 2017, UofL maintained its extremely high overall landfill diversion rate (through recycling, composting, and reusing) of nearly 78%.



 Unfortunately, this was achieved in the context of continued records in total <u>solid waste generation</u>, thanks to several demolition and construction projects.



 The <u>Free Store</u> in Unitas Hall continues to be staffed by volunteers and a student intern for weekly hours throughout year for free exchange of clothing, shoes, books, and household items. The Council secured a donation of \$1000 each from Republic Services and WestRock Recycling to cover the costs of student labor to operate the Free Store, which was able to do pop-up mini-stores at campus events and to expand the quantity of items processed through the store in 2017-18. Demand now exceeds the limited capacity of the small space allotted for the store in the basement of Unitas.



The <u>Lighten Your Load! Move-Out Waste Reduction</u> collected 4,751 pounds of reusable goods for donation to Goodwill, as well as non-perishable food items donated to the hungry through Old Louisville's non-profit <u>Cabbage Patch Settlement House</u>. In spring 2018, this UofL Case Study was included in The Post-Landfill Action Network's *Goodwill Not Landfill* program manual (S'18).



 The <u>UofL Community Composting Project</u> on our Hughes Lot continued to thrive with student interns and volunteer power, composting 81 tons of organic



wastes in 2017. Revenue from contracts for organics pickups from Heine Brothers, GenScape, and the new partner, Naïve Restaurant, continues to more than cover the costs of gasoline and student labor. Volunteer days are held year-round every Sunday noon-2pm, with volunteers welcome to take home finished compost for gardening and tree planting projects.



- Athletics and the Sustainability Council <u>launched</u>
   <u>tailgate recycling</u> at all six 2017 home football games,
   with teams of 8 volunteers walking the lot and
   distributing recycling bags and information to fans for
   four hours before each game. (F'17)
- ELSB Green Initiatives runs 3-week <u>E-waste</u> <u>recycling</u> drive that collects 250 pounds of items (F'17).

## **PLANNING & ADMINISTRATION**

# Coordination, Planning & Governance

- SGA advocates for sustainability considerations in <u>Presidential Search</u>. In a letter to the editor, SGA
   President Vishnu Tirumala outlines the student
   body's main concerns in the selection of the next
   President of the University of Louisville. Among those
   concerns are several points that are vital to
   maintaining UofL's progress in sustainability,
   including:
  - an advocate for sustainable construction and reducing our carbon footprint;
  - a strong and unwavering commitment to diversity in all respects;

- an appreciation for shared governance by empowering faculty, staff and student leadership;
- a commitment to transparency regarding the University, the Foundation and U of L Athletics;
- a commitment to ensure access to affordable student housing in the community.

On April 11, 2017, the Student Senate passed the <u>Presidential Search Act of 2017</u>, which stated "On the matter of sustainability, the UofL SGA recommends the new university President meet and embody these criteria:

- Commitment to reduce the carbon footprint of UofL in matters including, but not limited to, transportation, facilities management, and energy consumption; and
- Commitment to increase green-based initiatives on campus and on affiliated properties (including any and all Tax Increment Finance Districts (TIFs).
- Commitment to build with the most sustainable methods available in materials purchasing and construction processes." (F'17)

## **Fundraising**

- Council participated for the first time in the UofL Day
  of Giving with a targeted <u>Sustainability Initiatives</u>
  <u>page</u> and campaign that raised \$180 from five donors
  for the Green Fund of UofL. (F'17)
- Council launched April 6-22 <u>Arbor Day to Earth Day crowdfunding campaign to create a new Student Sustainability Fund</u>, with a \$5000 matching gift from Louisville-based Just Money Advisors. Donors encouraged to invest in high-value, hands-on education for 21st century social responsibility. (S'18)
- Council successfully secured a 3-year extension of a \$5000/year contract with the <u>Louisville Water</u> <u>Company</u> for promoting tap water on campus. (F'17)





Sustainability Coordinator Justin Mog, along with professors Ariana Levinson (Law), Michele Foster (Education); Maurice Gattis (Social Work), Bruce Kemelgor (Business), and Lisa Markowitz (Anthropology) submit, receive, administer and implement a \$7500 grant from UofL's Collaborative Consortium for Transdisciplinary Social Justice Research in support of the Louisville Association for Community Economics' effort to launch a community-owned/cooperative grocery store in one of the city's urban food deserts. (S'18)

#### Investments

UofL Launches Student Sustainability Fund & Philanthropy Program. Finance students explored socially-responsible investing. Students in Professor Cherie Dawson-Edwards' Social Change course selected the inaugural beneficiary of the Student Sustainability Fund: A Future In H.O.P.E. Youth Services, a local non-profit organization dedicated to housing and mentoring youth who are in the state's custody and getting ready to age out of the foster care system. (S'18)



 UofL continued participating in shareholder advocacy through a contract with <u>Institutional Shareholder</u> <u>Services (ISS)</u> to manage our proxy voting at shareholder meetings. UofL uses the standard <u>Socially Responsible Investment (SRI) Proxy Voting</u> <u>Guidelines</u>.

# Health, Wellbeing & Work

- UofL expanded the Smoke-Free Campus Policy to include all tobacco products and e-cigarettes in a new Tobacco and Vaporizing Products Policy. (F'17)
- Louisville Mayor Greg Fischer and the Worksite
   Wellness Council of Louisville recognized UofL with a

- platinum-level award for its employee wellness program, Get Healthy Now. (S'18)
- Council assists Office of Health Promotion and SPHIS with successful application for and implementation of a mini-grant from the Kentucky Agency for Substance Abuse Policy (KY ASAP) for \$1728 to install <u>Smoke-Free Signage</u> on Belknap Campus. SGA also contributed funds. (S'18)
- Gender identity 'gatekeeper' removed from UofL HR process. UofL gave employees more control over their own data by letting them update their gender identity in the HR system. Previously, an employee would have had to bring legal documents to HR if they wanted to change their gender. (S'18)
- <u>UofL School of Medicine creates Medical Mile</u>

# Campus as a Living Lab

• Tapping Campus Trees for Syrup: Students tapped 19 trees on Belknap campus to gather sap for syrup, learn about the process, and study the environmental conditions that influence it. The Biology Department loaned its tapping equipment for the project. The syrup-making arrangement with our community partner, Dave Barker, was maintained and he oversaw the tapping of 90 trees on UofL's Shelby Campus, and returned to Belknap campus to explain the process and share the finished product with the campus community at a <u>Maple Tapping Workshop</u> (Jan. 19, <u>Photos. Video.</u>), and <u>EcoReps Workshop</u> <u>and Pancake Party with UofL Maple Syrup</u> (Apr. 13, <u>Video</u>) (S'18).

- Council & Campus Housing organized <u>Ecolympics</u> <u>2018</u>, with UofL participating in two national sustainability competitions:
  - 1. RecycleMania! (Feb. 4 March 31, 2018), a friendly annual competition among North American universities. UofL competed to reduce waste, increase recycling & composting, and raise conservation awareness across all three campuses! In the Diversion category, UofL upped our game from 2017, again finishing #1 in the state and 19th out of 171 nationally, with an overall Recycling Rate of 57.05%. UofL came in 2nd in Kentucky for the Per Capita Classic, having recycled 14.426 lbs/person (70th nationally). In Total Recycling, UofL finished 2nd in the state and 53rd in the nation, recycling 358,729 lbs. over 8 weeks. UofL was the only Kentucky school to enter the Electronics Waste Recycling competition, finishing 46<sup>th</sup> in the nation after collecting 300 lbs (or 0.012 lbs/person) of electronics for recycling.





2. UofL competed in the Campus Conservation
Nationals February 11 to March 4, 2018. Residents
were able to reduce electricity consumption 2.05%
across all eight residence halls in the competition.
This represents a total savings of 3,135 kilowatthours of electricity, saving 2.3 tons of carbon
emissions or the emissions from driving an average
car 5,718 miles. All but two of the halls were able to
reduce electricity consumption, with the following
reductions: Bettie Johnson Hall 19.9%, Louisville Hall
6.5%, Threlkeld Hall 6.3%, Unitas Tower 5.1%, Billy
Minardi Hall 4%, and Miller Hall 3%. (S'18).
