# **HAPPY EARTH MONTH!**

Are you going to observe the <u>Total Solar Eclipse</u> this month? Where do you plan to be during this historic moment? Will you be stationed at <u>your local park</u>, perched at an <u>exclusive spot</u> with the best view or slouched on your couch <u>watching TV</u> – avoiding the ruckus of an excited crowd with <u>makeshift telescopes</u>? I have not decided yet about my own plans to witness this once-in-a lifetime phenomenon. I marvel at how the Earth finds <u>dramatic ways</u> to get our attention from <u>horrific wildfires</u>, <u>floods</u>, <u>pandemics</u>, <u>droughts</u>, and <u>Kentucky cave systems</u> for the world to behold. I am not going to lie – I welcome the joyful hoopla in this moment after wearily recovering from the aftermath of the latest concerted attempts in the <u>anti-DEl movement</u> here in Kentucky. Thank you, Earth, for giving us an excuse to celebrate!

As an elementary public-school kid living in Louisville in the 1990s, I had the opportunity to celebrate Earth Day through student-led parades, sculpture-making and co-creating rap songs like "Save Our Planet" at Brown School. I can recite those same rap songs now for you if you ask. Our passionate and hippie educators (many who have since passed on) shared with us as young students to deeply value our Earth as a shared space of beauty and generosity. Thirty years later - as a slightly workaholic adult, I try to remember to recycle correctly but I am not consistent. When there is uneven structural reinforcement, policies, or practices to safeguard proper recycling, I sometimes forget - and I am not alone. By raising our intersectional feminist awareness about our intimate relationship with the Earth, this time of the year elevates how complex we really are - on the only known and accessible planet in the universe that nurtures us, human beings, immaculately. How often do you think about the health of the land in your neighborhood and your individual relationship with the Earth?

### **BOTH/AND THINKING - OUR COMPLEXITIES**

I can <u>feel helpless</u>, guilty, and righteous when I consider <u>climate injustices</u> and how I can help <u>Mama Earth</u>. My sister, <u>Nubia Bennett</u>, who works in <u>leadership</u> development, reminds me in our daily chats that as human beings we are always "participating and resisting <u>at the same time</u>" in systems and institutions that consistently <u>devalue our humanity</u> and <u>the most vulnerable</u> members in <u>our communities</u>. From <u>our elderly neighbors</u>, <u>unhoused</u> and <u>uninsured people</u>, <u>rural families</u>, <u>disabled folks</u>, <u>queer folks</u>, <u>artists</u>, <u>sex workers</u>, <u>low-paid laborers</u> or <u>families living in affluent neighborhoods</u> off an elite <u>lakefront</u>, we are all touched by our collective practices in <u>stewarding the Earth</u>. When I get adrenalized about purchasing a new pair of designer high-waisted jeans from an online fashion company, I can conveniently use <u>cognitive dissonance</u>. I can choose to ignore the lived experiences of other fellow humans, <u>mostly women</u> who construct the garment miles away in terrible working conditions as well as the detrimental <u>carbon footprint</u> in the delivery of the jeans to my home. I too am part of the problem.

In the poem, "The World's Heart," translated by Khaled al-Masri, the Arab woman poet, artist and filmmaker, Nujoom al-Ghanem writes:

We only recognized that sea laden with our mothers' fear after it raised its head high and ate the feet of our homelands...

<u>Scientists</u> across the world have all agreed upon a powerful truth – that climate change is here. Yet for centuries, <u>indigenous communities</u> were aware of this truth about environmental injustice and tried to warn us about the impact of our continued acts of unkindness upon the earth and its inhabitants. So here we are. Not all of us can <u>board a rocket ship</u> powered by <u>artificial intelligence</u> to find <u>a new habitable planet.</u> I truly believe that we must dream of a better world on the planet we already possess. Our ancestors did and so can we. <u>Intersectional feminism</u> provides an urgent framework of hope and loving action to honor the soil and animals that continuously give us grace despite the negligence we humans demonstrate every day.

### LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

This month, the Women's Center will host our inaugural conference aimed at elevating local women leaders and current scholarship about climate change with a gender equity lens. Who is most impacted by climate injustice? What is the emergent strategy to combat longstanding practices that exploit the Earth, animals, and our families? We are also continuing our second part of our student leadership development series, "Gumbo Ya Ya" with Sister Song, a Southern based, national membership organization, to deepen our understanding about critical strategy work, healing justice and our shared capacities to "do the thang." We invite you as students, staff, faculty and community members to join us for diverse programming events at UofL and the greater Louisville community to foster an expansion in our imagination of what is possible for all of us. Find your people. We are here.




