NEW SEMESTER. NEW KENTUCKY LEGISLATIVE SESSION.

Tuesday, January 2nd, 2024 marked the first day of the Kentucky General Assembly. Here are some important bills that were submitted:

- SB 71
 - Establishes a "state child and maternal fatality review team" composed of representatives of public health, social services, law enforcement, prosecution, coroners, health-care providers, and other agencies or professions deemed appropriate by the commissioner of the Department for Public Health.
 - The maternal mortality rate in Kentucky is **23.5%**.
- SB 63
 - Requires state-sponsored insurance, whether that be through Medicaid or employment insurance from state employees like public school teachers, to cover the cost for an annual pap smear.
- Menstrual Equity Bills
 - HB 64
 - Exclude menstrual products from sales tax and would take effect this August if passed.
 - HB 148
 - Requires each public school that includes any of grades six through 12 to provide free menstrual discharge collection devices to students.
 - Requires each local board of education to adopt policies for the distribution of free menstrual discharge collection devices.
 - Exempt from sales and use tax the sale or purchase of menstrual discharge collection devices.

It is important to reach out to your senators and representatives let them know what the public wants. You can find out who represents you and how to contact them <u>here</u>.
